MAN OF MANY COLOURS

Academic turned lunch bars into works of art

TOM GIBBONS

Lecturer, artist, author
Born: England, 1928
Died: Perth, aged 83



Life was a palette of plenty for Tom Gibbons, who died on February 16. In a studio he blended wit with the full spectrum of paints to transform everyday images into art. As university lecturer in English literature, Dr Gibbons — after completing a PhD at Cambridge — found fresh ways to raise awareness and enjoyment of texts. As author he had an international reputation as a commentator on artistic and literary material.

His view of life was kaleidoscopic: an ever-changing array of strong colours, words that morphed into pictures and photographs that amounted to a commentary on suburban glories, as he saw them, such as lunch bars or old brick “dunnies” backing into laneways.

Friends could be served kippers for lunch. This led to discussion of Kipps, a favourite Gibbons book, written by H.G. Wells in 1905 . . . another twist of the kaleidoscope turned conversation to the novelist’s The Time Machine (1895), then on to science fiction, Dracula . . .

Fascination with the alphabet, and juxtaposition of disparate objects such as newspaper, paint tube and butterfly, are evident in a current exhibition at Mundaring Arts Centre. Titled Setting Their Sights, the exhibit pays tribute to four artists known as the Perth Group, of which Gibbons was a founder member in 1958. He was then 30, experimental by temperament and meticulous in practice. From boyhood he had retained an eye for the playful.

Thomas Henry Gibbons was born in Salford, a hub of Greater Manchester in England, on May 10, 1928, the only child of a railway clerk, also named Thomas Henry, and wife Alice (Williams). Thomas senior had a gift for languages and was a translator when interned in Germany during World War I. He encouraged his son’s language skills as much as limited means permitted

and visits to libraries were frequent. The boy grew to remember his mother as sensitive and intelligent.

His wife, Miriam Stannage, recalls that, when he was a schoolboy during World War II, he saw flames from German bombing and he reprised the imagery in a sonnet, Snow Fire.

Immediately after the war he studied at University College, Hull, in Yorkshire. When founding a film society, he made posters to entice students to screenings. So began a lifelong love affair with typefaces and marriage of verbal and visual.

After graduation and National Service in the Royal Air Force, a first teaching post took Gibbons to Derbyshire. In 1955 he and his first wife, Jean, and their son emigrated to Perth, where he joined the staff of Scotch College. Though English and arithmetic were his main duties, the headmaster’s artist wife, Eileen Keys, helped extend his role.

Teaching art was a launch pad for creating his own. Still lifes from that period convey a sense of fun that endured during decades of solo exhibitions and the particular pride on hearing that the National Gallery of Australia in Canberra had bought his work.

In 1957 Gibbons became a lecturer at the University of WA, remaining until retirement in 1993. The day job was for the benefit of students whose grasp of irony in *Pride and Prejudice*, for example, was strengthened by his lively teaching.

A return to England in the 1960s for doctoral research became a

stimulating sojourn in an England far removed from the postwar restrictions he had escaped.

Back at UWA his contribution to campus life included designing and building theatre sets. At home and on holiday, ever inspired and encouraged by wife Miriam Stannage’s own artistry, he relished producing what many would call pop art. A commission from Channel 7 in the 1970s for 22 large film-star portraits was a highlight.

As author, Gibbons ranged from specialist literary criticism, as in *Rooms in the Darwin Hotel*, to lucid and accessible guidance such as *Literature and Awareness*. Though learned, he was no elitist. In 1983 the *Daily News* quoted him at length in an article about slipping standards of English.

Miriam Stannage says his art is imbued with a strong Christian faith. He described Stanley Spencer and James Joyce, both “deeply religious artists”, as two of his touchstones.

Practical kindness to friends was another constant. He regularly gave away CDs, DVDs, books and magazines. Retired UWA lecturer Collin O’Brien is among many who attest to that.

“I met him 50 years ago as my tutor,” he says. “Later, as his new colleague, he was the one who invited me to lunch. Fine gesture.”

Tom Gibbons, who had treatment for cancer last year, was pre-deceased by his sons from his first marriage, Dan, Tim and Ben. He died in Perth, aged 83, and is survived by his wife.

The legacy of art, writing and generosity is enormous. Hanging in Mundaring is a work called *Allsorts*. This could be the title of an autobiography he never wrote but in fact the images are the licorice variety. “This was important to a man who grew up during the Depression and World War II,” says exhibition curator Philippa O’Brien, “because it’s the ‘jar of lollies’ view of life. The future ‘will be full of goodness.’ And he discovered it to be so.”
